




Aldiviva! Vivaldi Live! October 17, 8:00 p.m.

Please welcome the marvelous Aldiviva Mandolin Quartet when they appear with their friend Christopher Wilkins and the Chamber Orchestra. This special concert will kick-off the Chamber Orchestra Series with a sparkling program celebrating everyone's favorite composer, Antonio Vivaldi.



Christopher Wilkins, Music Director and Conductor

John Cotten Thompson—Mandolin/Violin

John Cotton Thompson currently serves as a member of the first violin section of the Utah Symphony. In addition to fifteen years of performance with the Utah Symphony, he has also performed with the Utah Opera, the Salt Lake Chamber Ensemble, the Westminster chamber Orchestra and the NOVA Chamber Music Series. Mr. Thompson is a versatile musician who plays numerous instruments including both the treble and tenor viola da gambas, mandolin, keyboard, accordion and harmonica. Mr. Thompson graduated from Harvard and received his masters degree in violin performance from the University of Utah. Mr. Thompson has taught at the University of Utah and currently teaches through private instruction.

Patrick Zwick—Mandolin/Mandobass


Patrick Zwick is a multi-talented musician who is most known for his 30 years of performance as a bassist with the Utah Symphony. In addition to playing the bass, Mr. Zwick also plays the banjo, mandolin, mandobass, guitar, lute, and viola da gamba. With his passion for stringed instruments it is not surprising that Mr. Zwick is the founder of Aldiviva. In addition to his performances with the Utah Symphony, Mr. Zwick has also performed with the Santa Fe Opera, the Colorado Springs Symphony, the San Antonio Symphony, the North Carolina Symphony and the Grand Teton Music Festival. Mr. Zwick studied the string bass in Paris, the lute in London and the viola da gamba in Vienna. He served as performing arts coordinator for the 1980 Utah Arts Festival and on the board of the Salt Lake Arts Council.

Tully Cathey—Mandola/Guitar

Tully Cathey is an avid composer, guitarist and mandolinist who performs and composes both classical and jazz music. His works have been performed by the Utah Symphony, the Colorado Springs Symphony, the Boise Philharmonic, the Tulsa Philharmonic and the North Carolina Symphony. His composition "Elements" was recently performed by Windham Hill's Modern Mandolin Quartet. Mr. Cathey has also scored several documentaries which have aired nationally over the Public Broadcasting System and in Europe and the Middle East. Mr. Cathey has not only composed works for the Utah Symphony, but has also performed as featured soloist the NOVA Chamber Music Series, the Contemporary Music Consortium and the Tully Cathey Band. Mr. Cathey graduated with honors from Mannes College in New York where he studied both classical and jazz guitar performance. While in New York he studied under Leonid Bolotine, Eliot Fisk, and Robert Beaser. He also studied under Charles Jones at the Aspen Summer Music School and with Bruce Reich at the University of Utah. Mr. Cathey earned his Master of Music degree in music composition from the University of Utah where he currently teaches music theory and harmony.

Todd Woodbury—Mandocello/Guitar

Todd Woodbury is one of Utah's leading classical guitarists. For nearly two decades he has performed and toured throughout the western United States. Current collaborations with guitarist/mandolinist Paul Binkley of the Modern Mandolin Quartet, a Windham Hill recording group, include performing, touring and the release of their first recording. In addition to performing with Mr. Binkley, Mr. Woodbury has also performed with the Utah Symphony and on touring arts programs in Utah, Idaho, Washington, South Dakota, Arizona and WESTAFF. Mr. Woodbury studied with Jose Duarte Coste at the Lisbon Conservatory in Portugal, Oscar Ghilgia at the Aspen Music Festival, George Sakellariou at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, and Jose Luis Lopatigui in Cervera, Spain. Mr. Woodbury currently heads the classical guitar department at Weber State University in Ogden, Utah and is also a faculty member at the University of Utah and Westminster College in Salt Lake City.

Aldiviva in Colorado

Salt Lake City's Aldiviva Quartet tonight winds up a se-

ries of guest appearances with the Colorado Springs Symphony.

It performed concertos of Vivaldi, Britten and quartet member Tully Cathey during the Colorado orchestra's Adventure and Chamber series. Orchestra director is Christopher Wilkins, former associate conductor of the Utah Symphony.

Quartet members are Cathey, John Thompson, Patrick Zwick and Todd Woodbury.

Mandolin gets classic treatment



The Aldiviva Mandolin Quartet will join the Colorado Springs Symphony Chamber Orchestra for an afternoon of music by Vivaldi (five concertos), Britten ("Courtly Dances from Gloriana") and Aldiviva member Tulley Cathey ("Elements IV: Water").

"Aldiviva" is an anagram of "A. Vivaldi," one of the mandolin's few advocates, and was coined by Vivaldi's contemporary Benedetto Marcello. The quartet's members are among Utah's foremost string players: John Thompson (mandolin and violin), Patrick Zwick (mandolin and mandobass), Tully Cathey (mandola and guitar) and Todd Woodbury (mandocello and guitar).

The mandolin always has been a rarity in the concert hall (it's best-known as the high-pitched solo instrument in bluegrass music), but its situation went from bad to worse after the death of Vivaldi, and it all but disappeared from classical music.

Except for Mozart's use of it in "Don Giovanni" (for a picturesque effect), it was more than 150 years before another com-

poser took the mandolin seriously. This was Gustav Mahler, who loved the sparkle it gave to an orchestra, and used it at key moments, such as the emotional climax of "Das Lied von der Erde." Since then, the increasing willingness of modern composers to use the mandolin — and the rediscovery of Vivaldi — has given the mandolin a new lease on life in classical music.

larity, this is the first appearance by a mandolin quartet in Colorado Springs. Some listeners will be surprised at its effectiveness in the concert half. The mandolin projects more clearly than its cousin the guitar, and the Aldiviva Quartet's use of a mandolin consort (bass, alto, tenor and regular mandolins) rids the instrument of its restricted compass.

The other problem with mandolin concerts — a sound so distinctive that it tends to make everything sound somewhat alike — has been solved by the programming. The quartet uses mandolins exclusively on only three pieces, and each of these is by a different composer. For the other Vivaldi concertos, they change instruments, performing on violin, guitar or mandolin and guitar.


